Former Clarkston Youngster Dead No Leads in Brutal Slaying

Oakland County Sheriff Johannes Spreen told **The Reminder** Monday that no new leads have developed in the murder of Robert Ogg.

Robert, a five year old Brandon kindergartener was found badly beaten and unconscious Friday. He died Saturday at 4:48 p.m. in Detroit's Childrens Hospital.

The son of Robert, Sr. and Diane, of 740 Granger Road, Ortonville, was waiting for the school bus in front of his home at 8:15 a.m. Friday morning.

His mother had been watching from the window but had to care for her eight month old son Bryon. When she returned Robert was gone and she assumed he was on the bus.

But Robert never got on the bus. When he failed to return from school Mrs. Ogg called the school and discovered he had not been there.

He was apparently abducted and left face-down in an area 75 yards from his home.

Sheriff's deputies were called to the scene at 11:35 a.m. They searched the area with tracking dogs and about 25 minutes later Deputy Don McClellan found Robert about 30 feet from Granger Road among trees and brush.

He was fully clothes, his belt was wrapped around his neck and his face and knees were bloody, said Oakland County Sheriff Johannes Spreen.

Robert suffered from a fractured skull and hypothermia. He underwent surgery Friday at Crittenton Hospital and was later transferred to Detroit's Childrens because they have a pediatric intensive care unit.

A jogger seen in the area that morning has been identified and is not a suspect.

Police are not speculating whether a telephone call on Wednesday to Mrs. Ogg is



Trying to be a well-informed voter can sometimes be a very trying task. Next Tuesday we'll all be going to the polls to cast our votes for the candidates of our choice, but will we really know what those candidates stand for?

In compiling **The Reminder's Election '82 Voter's Guide**, we noted some interesting likenesses and differences we would like to share with you.

For instance, in the state representative races, Dunaskiss versus Trim and Seeterlin versus Nichols, the candidates are alike in many respects.

Dunaskiss and Trim both claim their experience in the State House as the number one reason why they should be elected. They both say their track record is best. In fact, with the exception of the unicameral legislature question, they agreed totally with each other's position. The one difference was that Trim favors a unicameral legislature and Dunaskiss thinks it would be too costly.

The same can be said for the Seeterlin-Nichols race. They do not vary significantly on any issue that we queried them about.

That matter changes, however, when one reviews the position of the candidates for county commissioner.

In the Fortino-Hampton race, it is difficult to find an issue that they agree upon. Fortino says the County Executive form of government isn't working; does not favor the Executive taking control of county departments like Children's Village and thinks the Safety Division should be merged with the Sheriff's Department.

On the other hand, her Republican opponent, Hampton, favors the County Executive form of government rigidly; thinks the Executive should have control of Children's Village and thinks the Safety Division should remain as it is. In addition, he feels commissioners should not be allowed to serve more than eight years, a rule that if in effect now, would mean Fortino would have to retire.


There's a great disparity in the Kuhn-Cybul race also. Although the two are next door neighbors, and very young in age and new to politics, they have several differences of opinion.

Kuhn thinks night meetings are a waste of effort; that the County Executive for the most

part is doing a creditable job; and that the jail should not be expanded.

Cybul says his opponent does not like night meetings because he plans to attend law school; that the Executive is not doing such a hot job; and that inmates should be utilized to help build a jail addition.







Fortino - No. Too many duplicating services and too great a cost for the taxpayer. I don't think voters expected to give the County Executive all the power he now has.

Hampton - Yes. I can't understand my opponent going against the will of the people by introducing a resolution opposing it. It's effective, very successful and in the black.



Should the Oakland County Safety Division be disbanded?

Fortino - It should be merged with the Sheriff's Department. There would be a definite cost savings. Two departments create an adversary role and deter morale.

Hampton - No. The Safety Division has its place in county government. It protects county properties. I'm not in favor of consolidating it with the Sheriff, either.



Please tell us what particular qualifications you have that make you best suited for the county commission?

Fortino - Served eight years on Board of Commissioners. One Hundred percent attendance. Have knowledge of budget that few commissioners have. B.S. from Eastern Michigan University.

Hampton - Successful businessman. Owner of Real Estate firm, that has survived, despite poor economy. Not afraid to make decisions.

What do you think of Oakland County government as a whole?

Fortino - In many ways we're second to none in the nation. Our computer division and Parks and Recreation facilities are outstanding. However, we still must tighten our belts by eliminating needless positions.

Hampton - I'm impressed. Oakland County is blessed with some very good talent. The County Executive exhibits real expertise and the Board is sharp.

The County Executive would like to take over several departments of county government including Children's Village. Do you favor this?


Fortino - No. Just because Act says the County Executive can take it over, doesn't mean we should allow it to happen. The County Executive should concentrate on his own departments. He has problems enough keeping track of the County's gas and food.

Hampton - Yes. It's part of the Act. Let him be accountable for it.

What particular ideas do you have that would make the commission more effective?

Fortino - The Board needs a research staff. Right now we have to struggle to get information from the County Executive. That's unfortunate. Also need to review the budget earlier. Hearings should start six months earlier than they do.

Hampton - Commissioners should not be allowed to serve more than eight years. After that time, they begin to build empires and forget who their constituency is.




Do you favor more aid to public schools, and if so, how would you implement it?

Fessler - I favor consistent aid to our public schools wherein the money promised from state government is delivered. The majority of school districts have a declining student population; however, the state should provide funding which would remove the primary burden from property taxes.

Howarth - Yes. As outlined above, I think the withholding tax, if it remained here in the state could provide a lot of money for education.

Brotherton - Education should be the state's No. 1 priority, but it should also be run better on the local level. School boards haven't negotiated contracts properly. We are paying some of the top salaries in the country.



What can the legislature do to bring Michigan's economy around?

Fessler - Alleviate the burden of unnecessary government rules and regulations on the business community in Michigan, provide for a one-stop licensing department in state government and revise the Unemployment Compensation Act and radically revise or do away with the single business tax.

Howarth - A feeling of self-reliance must be created. Too often government steps in and screws things up. We need to cut the salaries of all state employees by 15 percent; quit paying withholding tax on public employees and stop the drain of money from our pockets to the Federal Government.

Brotherton - Jobs. We have created a hostile environment for business. The single business tax, property tax, worker's compensation, unemployment compensation -- they all add up to a big burden on small business and less jobs for the people of this state. And when people are unemployed it also means less taxes paid.



Do you favor property tax reductions? If so, how much and how would you make up the reduction?

Fessler - Yes, I favor property tax reductions and have worked actively for years inside the legislative process and by way of petition drives to reduce property taxes and exempt senior citizens from paying property taxes on school operational millage. Earmark and allocate one percent of our present sales tax, which is equivalent to \$450 to \$500 million dollars of revenue, for 1982-83, and decrease property taxes similar to the method used in the State of Florida.

Howarth - I object to the Homestead Property Tax.

Brotherton - Yes. I favor rolling property taxes back to their 1980 level and then cutting them 15 percent each year for the next three years. We can do without the taxes. The answer is not more and more taxes. Take a look at California.

Do you favor unicameral legislation? How about a part-time legislature?

Fessler - I do not favor a unicameral legislature; those states that have one are much more homogeneous than Michigan. I would favor a part-time legislature; I co-sponsored legislation in 1976, which had it passed, would have implemented such a system: Sixty days in the winter and thirty days in the fall.

Howarth - I favor both. In fact I would like to eliminate the Senate. If elected I will put my salary and officeholder's budget towards a petition drive to eliminate the Senate.

Brotherton - I favor a part-time legislature. It's successful in 45 states. In fact I'm helping to form a convoy from here to Grand Rapids that will publicize our efforts to get a part-time legislature. It could save the state \$20 million.





Do you favor property tax reductions? If so how much and how would you make up the lost revenue?

Seeterlin - Yes. The property tax is a poor tax. Taxes should be based on the ability to pay.

Nichols - It certainly needs reform. There are many inequities between one district to the next. The circuit breaker provision is good, but doesn't come until after taxes are paid.

Do you favor the practice of placing mentally handicapped persons in foster care homes?





But Johnny and television were made for each other. Our would-be or will-be governor, congresspeople, senators, etc., have had to be pushed and polished into television's unforgiving glare, so that they might appear kinder, softer, funnier, more dedicated.

What can we really tell about candidate Joe Jargon as he peers at us from cosmetically widened eyes, eyes riveted front and center, voice leavened with just the right mixture of stern indignation and ol' buddy intimacy as his otherwise controlled features wrinkle carefully with just the right degree of concern.

What do we really get as we gaze at J.J. down that long oblique tube that holds the closeup smile, nudges us with just folks' coziness, leads us to believe it, no matter what.

Today's political race is the race of the

public relations' team, a race to see that the candidate is groomed, tuned and rearranged to conform to television's glassy square. A candidate must be more visible than his or her own beliefs. He must project the peculiar mien of a person schooled but not too schooled, brave but not brash, girdled and guarded in word and expression, so not to offend.

Television has changed forever the lay of the political land and we might as well know it and use it to our advantage. Debates are an excellent vehicle to capture the elusive but truer soul that lurks beneath a candidate's made-for-TV pose. Given an astute moderator and an aggressive panel who will drill the politicians about individual/party stands, there is a chance for humanness and real information.

As for the ads, information is not the point. Charisma is. When our friend Joe Jargon nails us with those eyes, his hands folded neatly and with great precision like a funeral director with our best interests at heart, we can try to look through those television eyes to the person beyond, to Joe Jargon's real self, watching the flinch of human flesh that is sure to come, listening for the gulp or the quiver, the unrehearsed lint that is invariably there.

The video pitches do tell us something, however glossy the packaging, and as the battle for election quickens, newspapers and magazines become telltale tabloids as each candidate races to get in his/her last word. As voters, we need to squeeze every word and picture offered, because, in the words of Joe Jargon, "my fellow Americans, at this point in time, well, it's all we've got."





Friend of the Court

As indicated in my previous article, the Michigan Legislature has enacted the new "Friend of the Court Act." Since last writing, Governor Milliken has signed the law, and it becomes effective July 1, 1983. The act is designed to define and describe the powers and duties of the Friend of the Court, to insure that procedures of the Office protect the best interests of children in domestic

relations matters, to encourage and assist the parties in voluntary resolution of disputes, to compel the enforcement of visitation, custody and support orders, and to reduce the financial cost to the State of Michigan of providing public assistance benefits for the care of dependent minor children.

Various duties are mandated for performance by the Office. For example, before a domestic relations matter is adjudicated, the Friend of the Court must first provide an informational pamphlet as discussed in the previous article. The parties must also be informed of the availability of domestic relations mediation if there is a dispute as to custody or visitation. If domestic relations mediation is refused or unsuccessful, the Office must conduct an investigation and make a recommendation regarding child custody and visitation. An investigation and report as to child support must be made only if ordered by the Court.

The procedures to be used and the impact of the new statute are being devised at the present time, and may be the subject of future articles. The procedures for domestic relations mediation may prove the most radical change which occurs. Proponents believe that it will reduce the use of courtroom time, reduce the hostility and bitterness inherent in custody and visitation disputes, and reduce the costs involved in litigation. Critics argue that it will have little impact, as the parties will prove incapable of resolving their differences, and that it will unnecessarily lengthen the divorce process by adding a further step. Both positions will likely prove correct. In some cases, the parties will resolve their differences through mediation. In others, they will not, and it will prove to be a wasted use of time, effort and money. The mediation process will be discussed in greater detail in a future article.

The investigative function now performed by the Office will remain largely unaffected by the new law. While more clearly defined in the new statute, the process to be used seems in accord with the procedures now used by the Oakland County Friend of the Court. Other counties may need to revise some of their operations, but I foresee no need to change those currently utilized by Oakland County.





Waterford Fuel's Motto -- Dependable Service

Dependable service since 1932... that has been the motto of the Mohlberg family since the day Henry Mohlberg went to work for five well known men from the Waterford area.

Times were tough in those days and \$10.00 per week was barely enough to feed a family of five. But, Henry Mohlberg began his work as manager of the Waterford Farm Supply Co., owned by Robert C. Beattie, Sr., Russell Walter, George Whitfield, Percy King, and George Kimball. He took a then family business and built it into a successful business of furnishing coal, food and farm supplies to customers in the Waterford and Clarkston area.

The name of the company was changed to Waterford Farm Supply & Coal Co. Ten years later a new office building was built to accommodate the expanded business. In 1944 Henry Mohlberg became an equal partner in the business.

Over the years, as the business grew, more than 120 cars of coal were sold each year. The feed business grew to more than 3 carloads per month (remember Kasco Feeds with the "dress

print" bags?) women bought feed and made dresses out of the bags. It became a well known fad. Most everyone made dresses, aprons, and even shorts from those bags.

In 1952 fuel oil was added to the line and the name of the company was changed to the present "Waterford Fuel & Supply Co.", selling coal, feed, poultry supplies, fertilizers, seeds and fuel oil.


The business continued to grow and in 1960 ground was broken for the new and present location of the Waterford Fuel & Supply Co., at 3943 Airport Rd., Waterford, Michigan.

In 1961, Henry Mohlberg sold out his share of the business to his two sons, Robert and David, who are still the owners of the company. Since then, coal and feed have dropped from the line and lawn and garden equipment have taken their place, along with Martin Sons paint and Total gasoline, chain saws, and snow blowers.

A new 6,000 square feet addition has been added to the existing structure. The business now features such equipment lines as Toro, Snapper, Jacobsen, Yardman, Wheel Horse, Stihl, Poulan,

as well as a full line of parts for the do-it-yourselfers.

Although the kind of business is entirely different today than when it all started in 1932, the motto and aim is still the same for the Mohlberg family... "Dependable Service."






