Much Sickness Hinders Blood Bank

On Monday afternoon the auditorium of the Clarkston School was for a few hours practically changed into a hospital ward when the Red Cross moved in with the mobile blood bank equipment. Dr. Horwitz was in charge of the unit and Mrs. Marie Cunningham, registered nurse, was the supervisor. With the unit were seven nurses, 3 technicians, 2 motor corps girls and one registrar. Several Our Boys local nurses helped with the work.

Owing to a great deal of sickness in the community many who had registered were unable to donate blood, consequently of the 209 who registered there were 146 reported at the school and from this group there were 129 pints of blood obtained. This was below the quota and a few pints under what was obtained here last Fall. A healthy person can give blood every 8 weeks for 3 times and then every 3 months but no more than 5 times in one year.
