Children previously have been charged 25 cents per week for milk or 5 cents per half pint. Beginning Monday, September 26, milk will cost 25 cents per two weeks or 2½ cents per half <sup>,</sup> pint.

This reduction in milk cost does not apply to Type A lunches (hot lunches). It is applicable only to the extra milk consumption. For example: children purchasing only milk can obtain it at the rate of 2½ cents per bottle, or children purchasing an extra 1/2 pint of milk over and beyond that furnished with Type A lunches can purchase it at  $2\frac{1}{2}$ cents per bottle.
