The group will meet in Northville at the Northville library.

Arrangements have not yet been completed for meeting dates. The schedule will be based on the best time for most applicants.

Eighteen persons from the Northville area have already signed up. Librarian Mrs. Helen Wilcox says.

The Great Books program is tuition free.

Groups will meet every other week for a two hour discussion of today's problems through the reading of the works of the greatest thinkers and writers of all times — books which have left a permanent influence on western civilization.

Ten years ago, under the appeal, "Let's Think for Ourselves" the Great Books program was brought to adults of Detroit.

The demand for the program has been amply demonstrated by the number of groups since formed throughout the metropolitan and suburban area.

Leaders for the discussions in Northville are Donald Eldering of Salem, and George Lockhart of Northville, who have completed an authorized leadership training course under the auspices of the Great Books foundation.

Such questions as "Are all men created equal?" and "How should you bring up your children?" and "Is man superior to the state?" will be brought up as the group reads "The Declaration of Independence," Montaigne's "Essays" and Aristotle's "Politics."

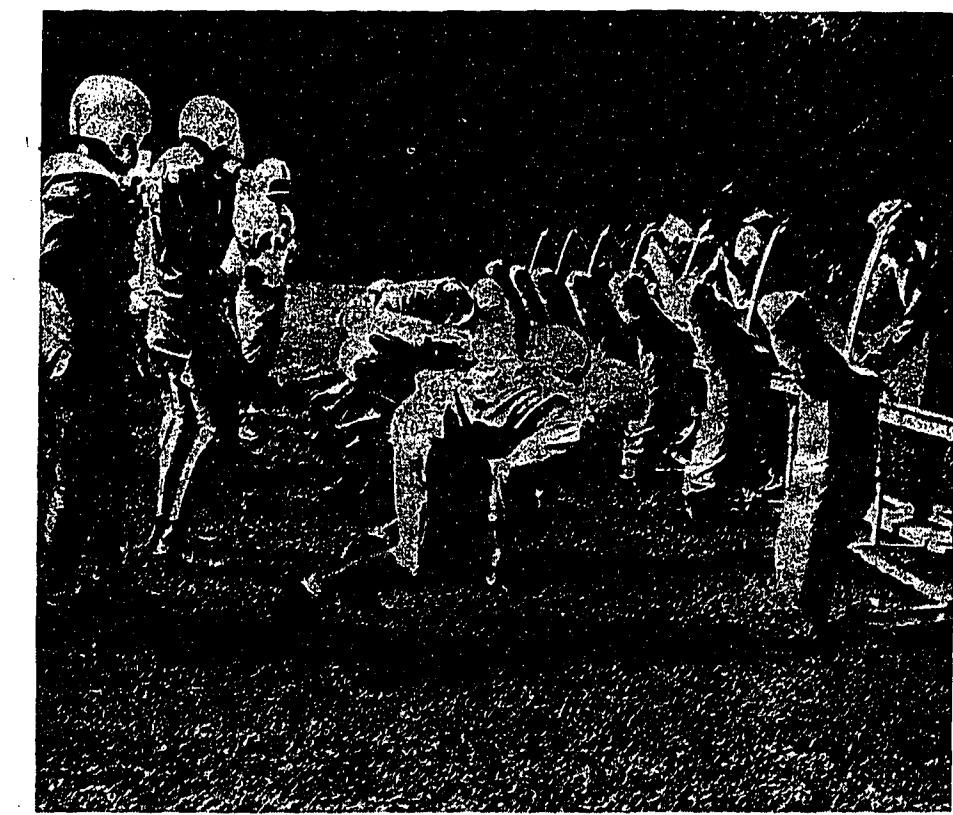

State Again Has 'Any Deer' Areas

Hunters will be able to apply soon for special permits to take "any deer" in 37 food shortage and crop damage areas of northern Michigan during the coming November 15-30 firearm deer season.

A total of 55,000 permits will be available to hunters as quickly as the permits and special area information sheets can be printed and distributed to the state's 4,200 license dealers.

Most dealers will have the permits by the last two weeks of September. Deadline for hunters to apply is October 10.

A total of 17,033 permits will be available in 12 upper peninsula areas covering 3,82 square miles. Permit holders in these areas will be able to take any deer — bucks, does or fawns — during the entire November 15-30 season. Other hunters during this season can shoot only legal bucks.

In the lower peninsula, 24 areas covering 10,868 square miles of trouble area will be open to permit holders. The same conditions apply here for hunters; those with permits may take any deer, those without can shoot only legal bucks.

Officials Explain School Tax Request

Novi school officials this week explained why they will ask voters on September 22 to approve a 2 1/2 mill increase in school rates for each of the next five years.

This picture of a growing financial squeeze, with the school budget soaring as costs and income, was presented by Superintendent William Medlyn and Secretary Kenneth Bernard in a question-and-answer session with The Novi News.

Novi school officials this week explained why they will ask voters on September 22 to approve a 2 1/2 mill increase in school rates for each of the next five years.

By Nov 2 1/2 mills, but only by 1.67 mills — because the coming year's operating millage is .83 mills less than last year's. That is, the county allocation board okayed 8.81 mills last year but cut it to 7.98 this year.

Why do you have to raise rates if the millage is approved? They'll total 17.48 mills — including the 7.98 approved by the county, the 2.50 special millage, and 7 mills previously levied.

As for reducing the faculty, Novi already is several teachers short. Some classes have as many as 40 students — far above the desired 30-student maximum.

And if the overall average reaches 34 students per class, state aid payments will be reduced — and a vicious circle will set in.

In addition, still more teachers will be needed as more rooms at Orchard Hills school are put into service.

Expenses already are at rock bottom. For example, only \$1,453 is to be spent on maintenance of the \$600,000 Novi school — far less than necessary.

What if the millage fails to pass? Cuts will have to be made somewhere. That will be up to parents and taxpayers to decide.

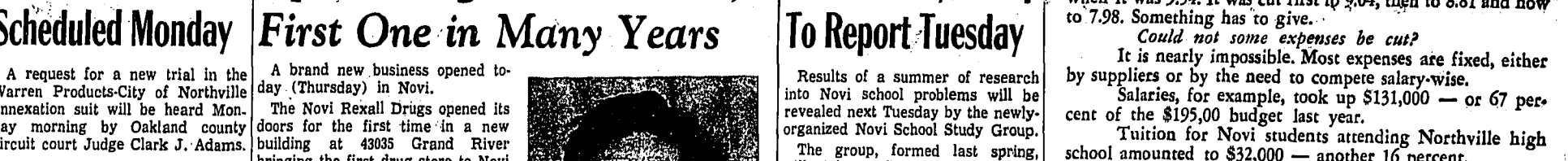
